Figure 1.1. Number of the daily reported laboratory-confirmed cases

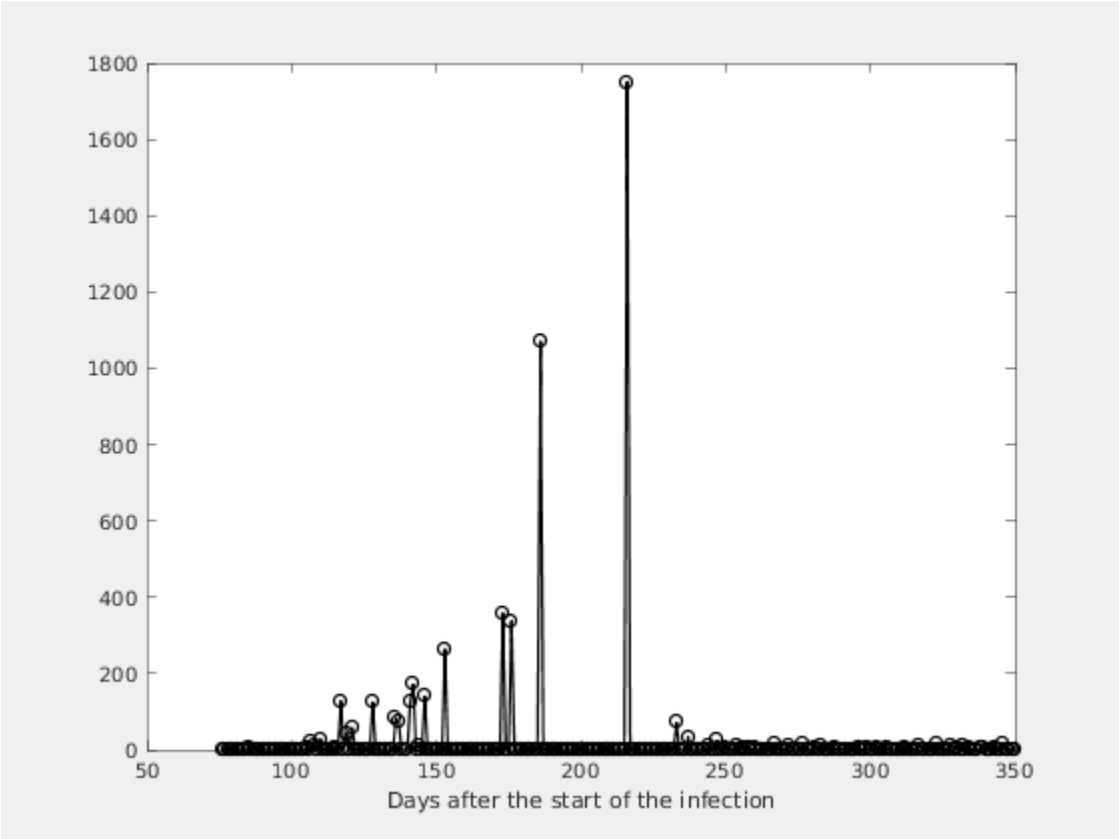
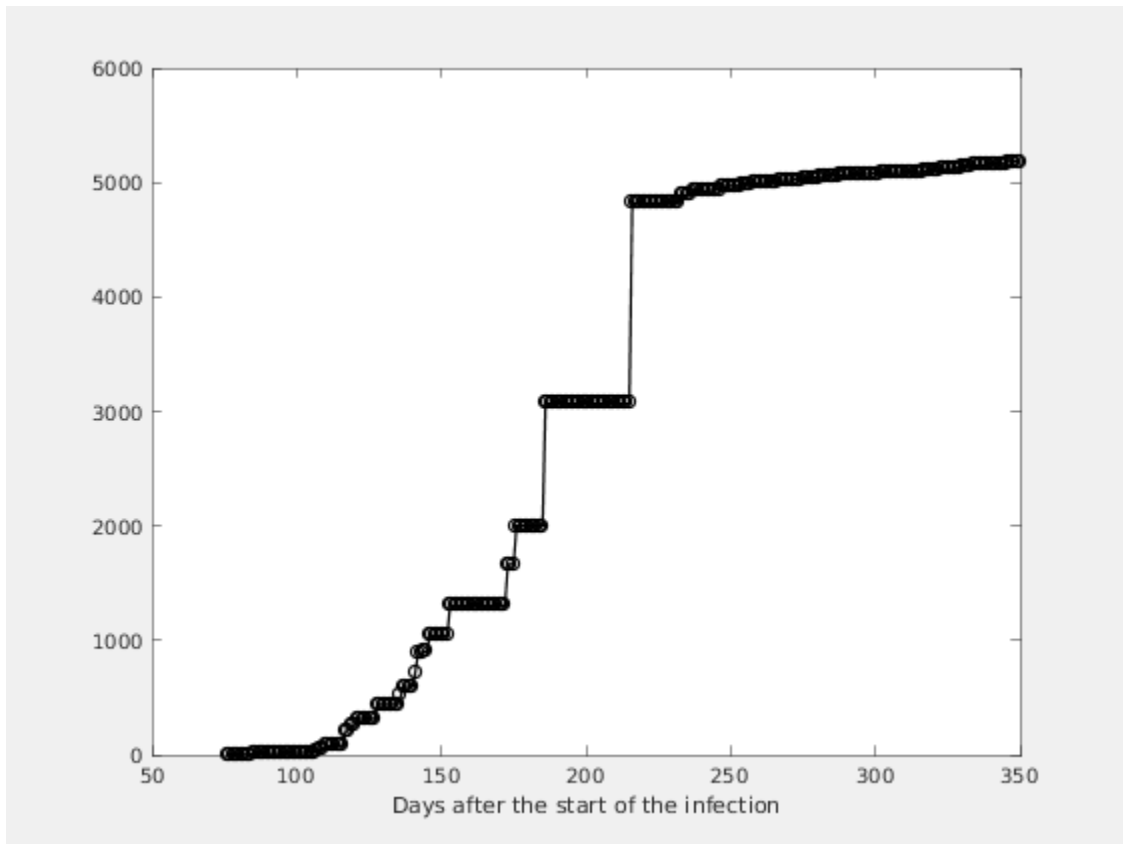


Figure 1.2. Number of the total registered cases

Figure 2.1. The Lotka-Nagaev and the Harris type estimator of the growth rate

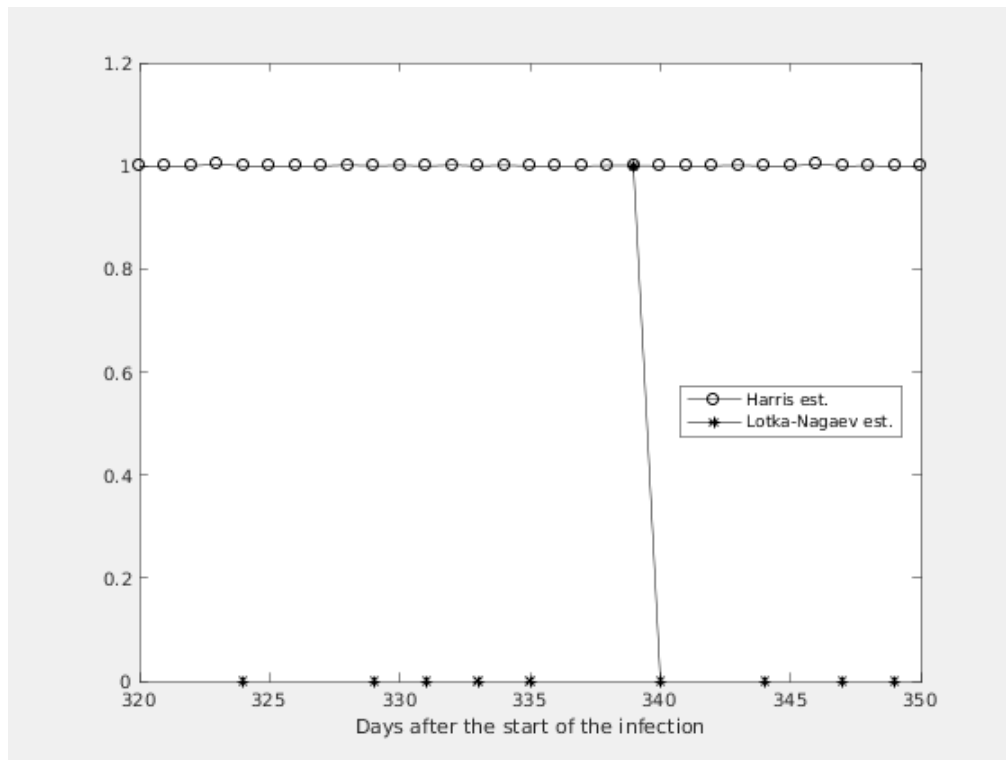


Figure 2.2. Figure

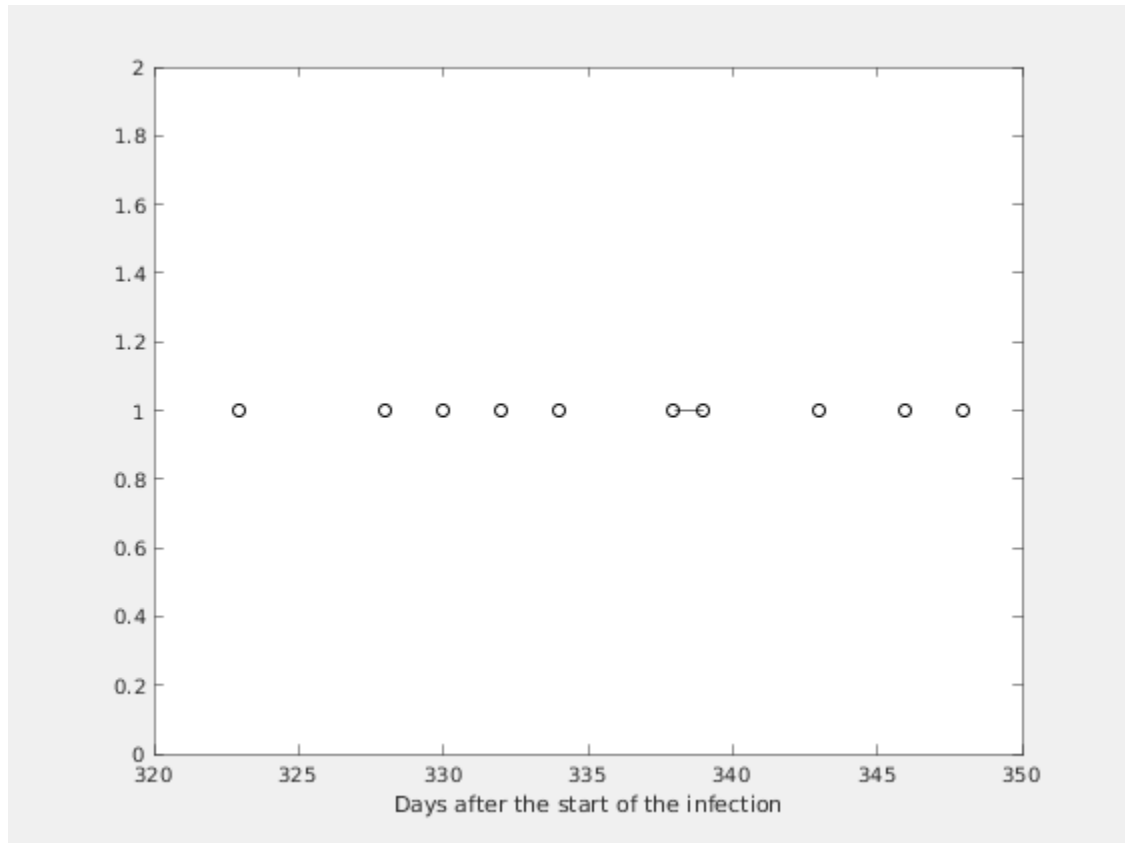


Figure 2.3. Expected number of the nonregistered infected individuals without immigration

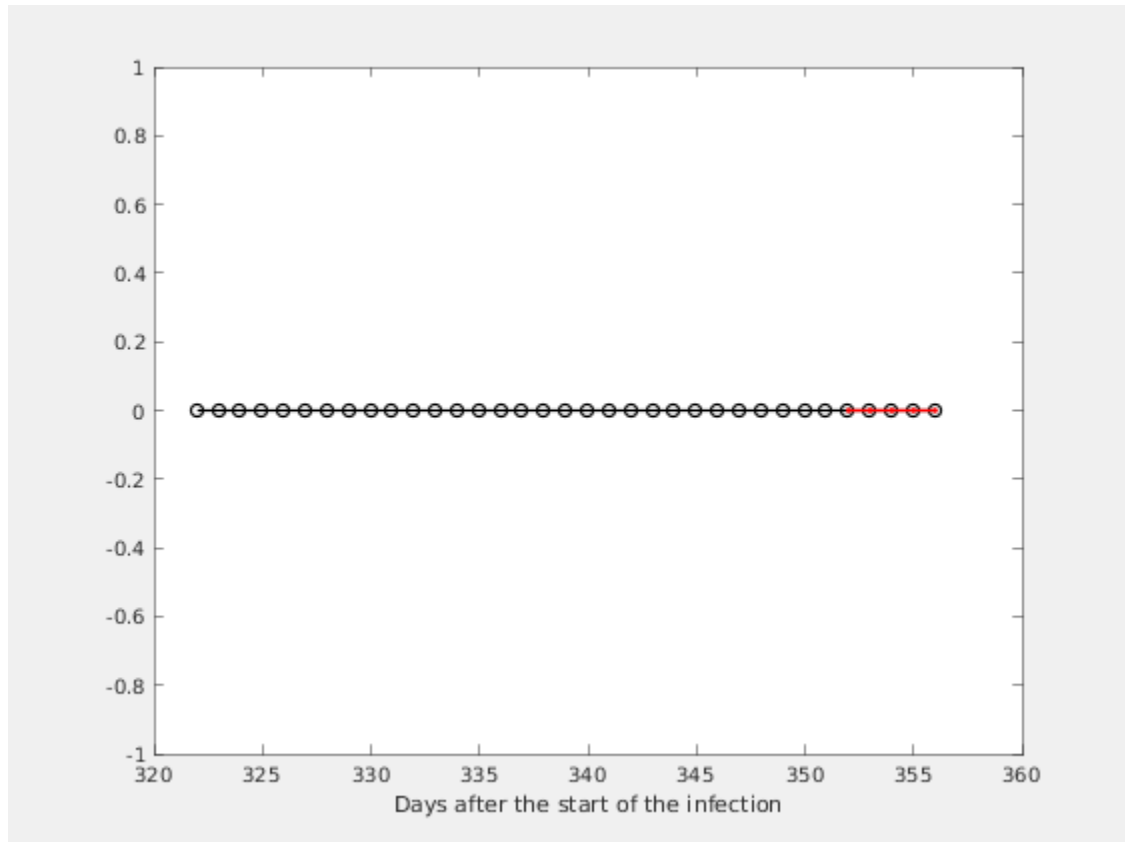
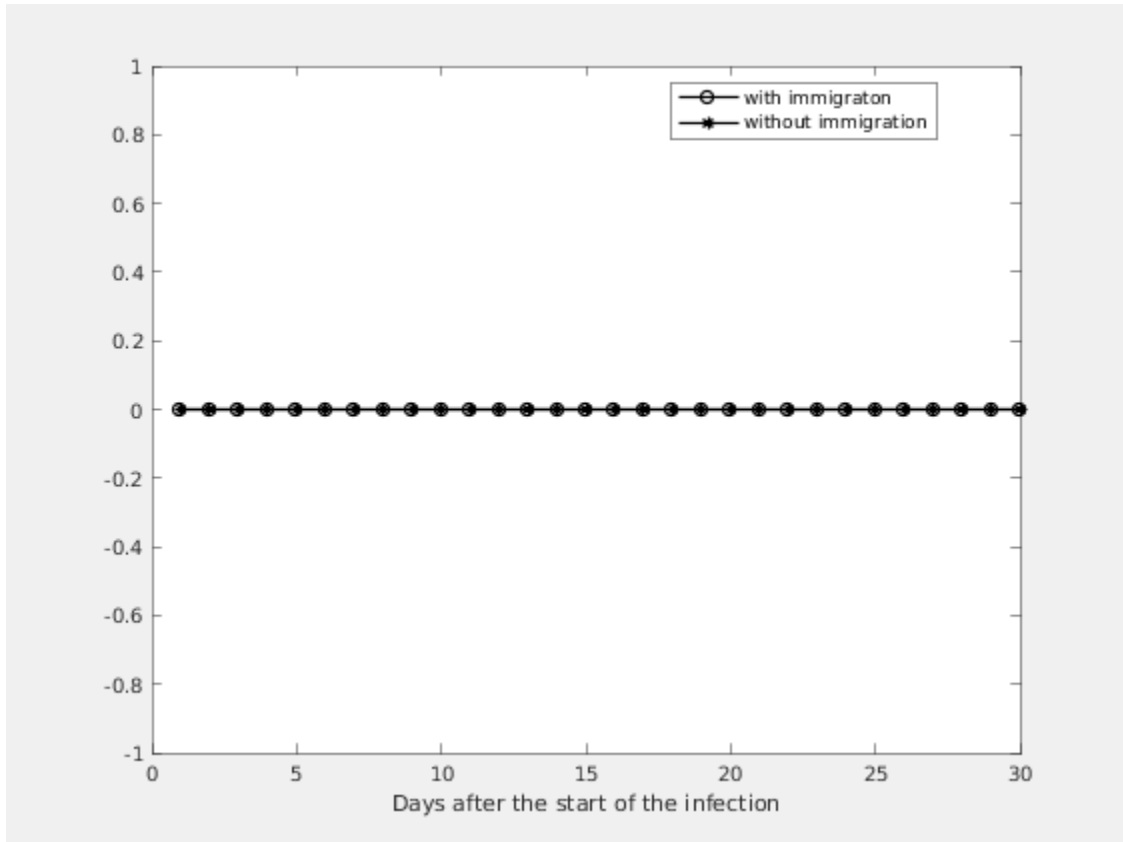


Figure 2.4. Expected number of the nonregistered infected individuals with immigration
